### CRIME REPORTING

The criteria used for UCR reporting is more restrictive and would not reflect the broad range of activity to which our personnel respond.

## PATROL

### *Calls for Service:*

The New Lenox Police Department handled 1,961 calls for service for the month of October. A call for service, simply put, is any sort of activity police personnel perform which is logged through Lincoln-Way Public Safety Communication Center (dispatch). Incidents in this category are representative of events either dispatched or officer initiated. Calls for service include criminal, non-criminal and administrative activity.
